Over the years, R&A Magazine has featured a number of homes that have gone through dramatic transformations by means of opening up the floor plans. As we've seen, knocking out a wall here and a wall there can completely change the look and feel of a home. In most of those projects, the homeowners were approaching middle age and were looking to improve traffic flow and to accommodate larger get togethers with family and friends. Enhancing their ability to entertain more comfortably was very much a motivating factor in opening things up.

While the project that we are showcasing in this edition is

similar in terms of converting a floor plan that consisted of small, partitioned, special purpose rooms, into a contemporary open space layout, the homeowners themselves were different from those previously introduced in terms of their age and motivation.

Our couple this time, Kristin and Ryan, are fairly young. At the time of the project, they had a one-year old daughter and were hopeful that she would not be their last. (She wasn't—another daughter is now on the scene.) As for their motivation, there was no mention of entertaining like we heard previously. (Perhaps that will come later.) Instead, what drove them was their desire to be able to allow free

movement of their daughter—while keeping her within their line of sight. As much as children roam, walls and small rooms just weren't going to allow that to happen.

In addition to opening up the floor plan, Kristin and Ryan also wanted to add an addition to connect the house with the garage. The additional space would allow for a master bath off their bedroom as well as a new more functional laundry and a separate mudroom entrance complete with very attractive cabinetry for storage.

Before jumping into our interview, I probably should mention that Kristin and Ryan's home is actually Ryan's childhood

Scope:	Homeowners, Ryan and Kristin, had plans to move into the house Ryan grew up in, but making changes to the home were vital before that could happen. On their list were renovating the floor plan to create an open living space, reconfiguring spaces for a functional laundry and comfortable master suite. An addition that was designed to connect the house and the garage made the list as well. This allowed entry to a mudroom and space to incorporate the master bath. Walls which confined several spaces including the stairway were removed to allow uncluttered visibility and grander living space.

home—purchased in 1992 by his parents along with an adjacent shop which were deeded together. The shop was a perfect solution for the family-owned cabinetry business which had long outgrown its original location.

With Ryan and Kristin's permission, I'm going to disclose the family business which over the years has grown to be among Lancaster County's premier cabinet shops and kitchen design centers—Conestoga Country Kitchens. 

that we had firsthand knowledge of this house. Although it was dated, we knew it was very well constructed and very well maintained over the years.

Kristin: We did look at other homes on the market but that can be risky. You never really know what you're getting. Disclosures don't always disclose everything. With this house, we knew exactly what we had—we had a good one! Knowing that made us very comfortable going forward with the project.





we work with many fine builders and remodelers throughout Lancaster County and we could have selected any one of them and would have been pleased with our decision. The deciding factor in selecting Metzler was simply our long-standing business relationship which goes back before I was born. Did you live onsite during construction?

ect. In the meantime, we were living in a condo that we had on the market and sure enough it sold, forcing us to vacate about a month or so before our project was to be completed.

Ryan: We could either move into our unfinished home or find a temporary arrangement to hold us over. We opted to move in.

Kristin: Not at first. To make a long story short, the home was rented for a few years until we were ready to move in. Once that decision was made, the renters moved on, leaving the home vacant for the proj-

Kristin: And the Metzler team was extremely accommodating in working around us, especially when you consider we had a one year old to deal with. Thankfully, they had all the demolition completed and had tarps and plastic walls set up to help contain the dust.

Ryan: Metzler and their team of subs could not have been more considerate in the way they worked around us. I was especially impressed with the way they left things after each workday. Everything was neat and orderly and all their tools were removed. While we spent most of our time in the basement, we would venture upstairs on weekends to check things out. With our daughter crawling at the time, you can imagine my concern for her running into a stray nail, screw or staple. Thanks to the Metzler team, that didn't happen. They were especially diligent with their clean ups and it was very much appreciated.

Kristin: We also appreciated how considerate they were regarding our

schedules, especially nap time. They were very conscientious to the fact that we were living here.

Tim: That's good to hear because we consider that vital to the success of any project where the homeowners are living onsite. Working in an occupied home requires a whole set of sensitivities to the client that aren't required in new home construction. This is important to us and is a major consideration in selecting subcontractors. While some may be excellent at what they do, they must have the right personality and skills to work in someone's home. That's a must for us.

Ryan: It was good knowing that Metzler has a steady team and a core of subs that they've worked with for years—it certainly raised our comfort level.

With the project complete, what do you like the most?

Kristin: I like everything that we did, but I really like the openness that we created and the improved utilization of space.

Ryan: Removing the walls was a great move. The girls can be playing pretty much anywhere in our first floor living area and still be within our line of sight. Another good move was doing away with the dining room which my family seldom used.

Kristin: Also, the addition has been big for us. It's great having a private bath off our bedroom and the mudroom has so much functionality—I just love it.

Ryan: For the mudroom, I think the cabinets and drawers are what makes it. To have a place to stow things—shoes, coats, hats in an organized fashion—is nice to have. It really helps to get rid of the clutter.

Tim: From a designer's point of view, planning for storage is always critical. It's important to create as much living space as possible but you don't want to sacrifice storage space. You'll regret it later.

Ryan: Tim did a wonderful job in drawing up the plans for the addition and

helping us reconfigure the plans to open up space. His design expertise—especially in identifying our load bearing walls—was invaluable.

What reaction have you gotten from your family and friends?

Ryan: Everyone is just amazed at how

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
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much different the house looks. The transformation has been very dramatic—especially for my siblings who remember how it used to be. My father and my late mother had plans to connect the house and the garage, but never got around to it. Dad was happy that we did and that we did it while we were young and not have to regret it later. Some of my cousins couldn't believe that it was the same house—once inside they barely recognized it.

Any advice for homeowners on the fence about doing a project?

Ryan: Yes, I'd tell them not to wait but to do it as soon as they possibly can. The sooner you do, the longer you and your family can enjoy the benefits. If you wait too long, life circumstances may interfere with those plans completely or limit the number of years you get to enjoy it.

Kristin: Another reason for acting when we did had to do with our family plans. We came into this with the mindset that this was going to be our forever house. We were also hopeful of having another child and thought it would be easier to get this completed before that happened. In doing so, I think we've created a home that is very conducive to our family life style for now and years to come.

In closing, is it fair to say that you are pleased with the outcome of your project and the performance by Metzler Home Builders?

Ryan: We couldn't be happier with the way things turned out. From the very start when we first started working on the design through project completion everything went extremely well.
